### Meet Karen Dennis

I have been weaving fabric more or less for 29 years. About two years after moving to Three Rivers. I got to be friends Jan Hughes who encouraged me to come out to the loom room. So I did and what fun it was! My very first project was a vest with bright pink warp and denim weft with a bright red shot between each denim strip – and no I didn't save it – a young girlfriend thought it was great so away it went.

Born in Pomona and raised in Riverside, I learned to crochet and knit (sorta) by watching my grandmother (you had to stand behind her and watch to understand what she was trying to tell you). My mother taught me to sew at an early age. Camping was an annual summer family event and weaving a "basket" from found materials became a way to remember those trips. Sewing was an early passion, winning me honorable mention in the Seventeen Magazine sewing contest and helping meet college expenses, so fabric has always been a part of my life. One day at college I opened my double door closet and just admired all that beautiful fabric stacked floor to ceiling. It wasn't until 1978 that I first saw a loom at a friend's house in Santa Barbara it was folded flat against the wall. She told me how it worked and I remember thinking that weaving might be a fun thing to try someday.

Well that someday was in early 1983, the year the Loom Room closed, I was one of the last beginners they let start. Jan, Peg and all the women weaving were so sharing, caring, and giving with their knowledge, I soaked it up. Kaweah Konnection formed after the Loom Room and the second Wednesday of every month became sacred. I even worked my job at Sequoia Park around it! My most memorable project was 10 yards of space dyed rayon fabric designed to resemble stained glass windows and it was commissioned by my sister none the less! Thankfully the weaving goddesses were on my side for that one!

At one of the early weavers' conferences, I took a silk spinning class, and that got me hooked as well. I spun everything I could, then put it away as life calls you another way. My little spinning wheel kept singing to me in its dusty corner and so finally I pulled it out and started spinning again. I re-discovered the relaxation of spinning.

So between dying, spinning, weaving, sewing, crocheting, knitting, knotting, beading and braiding, experimenting comes naturally, and I have fun figuring out how to make it all work so it will come out like the picture in my head!!
