FISHING FOR INFO... with Lynda Bass

Our guild has embarked on an overshot project, of which I spoke in our March Roving. While we work through this project, there are some weaving problems that may occur. I have a few members emailing me about these issues and I will share the issues and my solutions here.

**Question:** I've noticed that although I had 15" coming thru the reed, the actual measurement of my improved sample is 14". It had pulled in one inch! Is there any way to overcome this problem?

**Answer:** This is an ongoing thing that weavers must be aware of. While the weft thread travels over and under the warp threads some of its length is 'eaten up'. This is something that changes with the changing journey of the weft changes as the structure of the weave changes. The longest journey is the plain weave, over or under every thread. With twills, for example, the weft can scoot over a couple of threads, then under a couple, making it a shorter journey. The weaver must watch this carefully to keep draw-in to a minimum. After one has woven for a while and gets some experience, a 'feel for it' is developed. Because of the extra length needed, weavers use a 'bubble' when they throw the weft. To do this, I usually check the edge is not loopy, nor tight, and then make sure the weft thread goes up toward the reed at a 45 degree angle, so that there is extra weft length for the under/over journey it must make. Then, when we bring the reed toward the fell, the excess weft in the shed will be able to exit the side.

**Question**: My warp threads keep breaking on the right selvedge, could I be beating too much or too hard?

**Answer:** I am sorry to hear that! When are they breaking – as you beat; while you throw the shuttle; or, when you advance the warp? Is there draw in? If so, perhaps they are being abraded by the reed, weakening them. It could also be an uneven tension. When you start the next square, and have done the tabby previous to it, choose the threads that are loose (if there are any) and pull on them enough to even the tension. With a tapestry needle, choose them, and holding it horizontally, you can tug some up a tiny bit until the tension is even. This will give you some little humps in the tabby, but if it helps the tension, it may be a good thing. If you think it is a tension problem from the very beginning, and you feel you have enough warp, you could cut off what you have woven and tie on again. Also, I have padded the warp on the back beam to even out my tension, by putting something between the last wrap of warp on the beam and the one beneath it.

**Follow-up:** As **RE:** the coverlet - I'm not sure what happened, but with this next square on the coverlet, it all seems better! I'm not using quite the max tension that I used and the selvedge threads seem to be OK with no breakage (so far). I really like that idea of putting something behind the warp on the back beam to help with tensioning problems - perhaps some packing bubble thingies or something soft but firm?

**Question:** I've been beating before and after each shot - seems to be working better. Do you have a special beating procedure for overshot that you use?

**Answer:** I am now finished with the first of the squares for the project. I am on my BabyMac so that the beater has a very delicate beat. I need to be sure to square the design I am doing, so I am beating it really firmly, twice, changing the shed, and beating it again. Madelyn van der Hoogt says to change the shed and then beat. Since the shed has changed, it locks in the weft and keeps it from bouncing out of it position. Because we are using cotton on many of these squares, and

it does not pack in like wool, squaring the image is a bit more difficult, but it can be done, even with a flimsy beater!

I have also been working on keeping the draw-in to a minimum. To combat this I have added a side temple. It is a very make-shift thing. You need two large paperclips, some weight and string. If you have high sides on your loom alongside the woven fabric, you only have to hang some weight over the side (equal on both sides) from a string, using an unbent paperclip as a hook, set into the selvedge. You move it up every inch or so. It seems to work well. Some have fashioned these out of alligator clips, but I had the paperclips, weights from my knitting machine, some plastic grocery bags and of course, string. It isn't very pretty, but it works. Voila, a temple!

I hope that these questions and answers will speak to you and will help you build good habits in your weaving, or make you feel confident in what you already do at your loom. Happy Weaving.
