Fishing for Info

Plain Weave or Tabby?

Weaving jargon or technical terms can be a big hurdle when someone starts to weave. We all come up against it. When one begins a new skill or craft, there are new words to learn and to use properly. Weaving has been around for so many years, that terms become jumbled and through repeated misuse, they stick and become 'understood', yet not technically correct.

When do we use the term tabby, rather than plain weave? It is used to describe the ground cloth woven between pattern threads. This is especially seen in overshot where it is needed because of all the floats in the pattern weft. It quietly gives the fabric

substance and integrity, while the pattern threads play on its surface and delight its viewers with its wonderful pattern. Summer and Winter is a weave structure that does much the same thing, as are other tied unit weaves.

Many times there is no tabby in the draw down, merely a mention such as "Use Tabby" in the draft. This can be confusing, especially to someone who is just starting to weave.

Plain weave makes an intersection (an over and under) at regular intervals and at every opportunity. Plain weave is the umbrella where Tabby lives, but there are many other plain weaves out there. Some are given a different name mainly because they rely on the weave and color to make themselves a different from their related structures, such as Log Cabin. Some rely on a variety of the grist (thick or thin) in its warp only, its weft only, or even both. Some rely on the spacing in the reed to give it distinction; spacing the warp, weft or both can really change the personality of a fabric. Some are crowded in the warp (think repp). Changing the fiber, thread size, color and spacing can give you an infinite palette of weaves, just using plain weave.

So here is a list of plain weaves you may find interesting:

Percale, batiste, poplin, voile, pongee, taffeta, chambray, broadcloth, chiffon, muslin, organdy, gingham, flannel, calico, cambric, grosgrain, repp, tapestry, dimity, china silk, crepe de chine, challis, madras, windowpane (texture or color), basket weave, canvas, seersucker.

Think about the plain weave. It is structurally the soundest and strongest weave. With a huge variety from which to choose.

Squeekie Wheels: The spinning group of Guild Members meets the 1st Wednesday of each month in Porterville at Sierra Hills Retirement Community located at 2500 W. Henderson Ave. from 10am-3pm; bring your lunch or buy it there and eat in the dining room (cost is usually \$5.00).
