Dee Dee King shares these memories of Jeanette as well:

It is with great sadness that I learned of Jeanette's passing. She was a master weaver, a kind soul, and positive in her outlook on life. Jeanette taught many a new weaver the basics of our craft and set them on a path of creative fulfillment. She will be missed in this world by those of us who were lucky enough to know her.

Jeanette Barton is the reason I came to be a member of Hand weavers of the Valley. I first met her in March of 1977. My husband and I had moved to Visalia in November of the previous year. We had rented a horrible little apartment and were waiting for our new house to be finished. I had brought two large looms with me from Los Angeles, and they were taking up most of the floor space in our apartment. By that spring, I had cabin fever so bad that one sunny Saturday morning I set out to "find the weavers" I had heard about that were in Three Rivers. There, along the highway that ran through Three Rivers was a cute little shop called Mountain Arts, owned by Jeanette.

On that sunny March morning, Jeanette was just about to leave to drive down to a Hand weaver's meeting that was going to take place in Porterville. Jeanette urged me to follow her down the hill to the meeting, so I did. When we got there, Jeanette introduced me to a whole crowd of very nice people and they invited me to join the group. I had met the "weavers", and was thrilled to be a part of the group. There were expert weavers in that group, and most had learned the craft so that they could create things to decorate their homes. It was an inspiring bunch, with Jeanette one of the most talented.

One of the things about Jeanette that caught my attention was that she was able to successfully sell her craft products. When she asked me if I would like to sell my weavings in her shop, we began a mutually beneficial business arrangement. She sold a lot of my rugs and placemats over the years. She was always very complimentary of my work, which was very high praise from such a master weaver, and it was always a treat to drive up the hill to see her and the shop for a visit to drop off product. I looked forward to seeing such a sweet gentle soul.
