ICYM- In Case You Missed It

Ice dyeing is the easiest thing. Soak the cellulose fiber item (t-shirt, cotton warp, college bound bath towel) in a solution of 1 cup of Soda Ash Fixer per gallon of water for 20 minutes or so. Save the left-over solution for another future project. Then wring out as much of the liquid as possible. Arrange the item in a colander, black nursery flat, or something that can drain, put a scant layer of ice on top of the item, then sprinkle dry dye powder (Dharma fiber reactive dyes) over the ice. It doesn't take much dye! Place the loaded colander in the sun and let the ice melt.

When the ice is gone, place the dyed item in a plastic bag to cure for 12 to 24 hours. Rinse thoroughly in cold water, which stops the chemical reaction. Let the item drip dry a little bit, and then wash and dry the item. If you have dyed a warp or yarn, after rinsing, just let drip dry completely, and use. Wash after weaving.

Use Synthrapol, or Dharma's textile detergent to help keep from back staining colors.

Wear a mask and protective equipment, as recommended. Color Catchers come in handy in the wash.
