In <u>February</u>, there will be a slight change in the calendar due to unforeseen issues. If you are Zooming in, please have YOUR project record book close at hand. <u>March</u> is just around the corner. Get your handwoven goods ready for the Spring Fling of Handwovens on March 19th. <u>April</u> brings Sylvia Leidig to our program podium. Sylvia will talk about the Weaving Structure: Twill.

<u>May 14th and May 15th</u>, Annie MacHale returns to challenge our knowledge of Inkle Loom weaving/ pick-up and inspire us to continue our journey with Annie.

Annie MacHale Inkle Loom May 14-15, 2022

Remember, Annie was the very last in-person workshop before all closed in March 2020. For those who are interested in the very portable Inkle Loom, Annie is a great teacher. She has presented two options for her workshop and if you have a preference, please email me (<u>rooksworld@sbcglobal.net</u>) as soon as possible. Annie is very open to our needs; she is willing to tailor the workshop. Estimated cost is \$175, plus a (possible) materials fee.

These are two separate classes. Think about which one you want or need.

1) **Baltic Pickup**- this would be a stand-alone class for anyone who has experience in inkle weaving and is ready for the challenge. If students finish a project (not very likely based on past experience) they could bring it the following day for the second class.

2) **Practical Ideas for Using an Inkle Band**- I can bring some assorted hardware (available to sell to students).

We can discuss cutting and handling, hand sewing, braiding and twisting, installation of various types of hardware. I would show a lot of examples that I've made. Students could bring their woven bands and complete some of these: belts, suspenders, guitar or ukulele straps, key fobs, lanyards, headbands, hatbands, sashes, bracelets, etc. It would require a little advance notice from me about specs for various items. I think that I could make a list for you to distribute.

Huck Lace Towels -- A Virtual Workshop in Color and Design September 17,19,24, 2022 ZOOM

My estimate for the cost of this class ranges from \$110 (15 people) to \$175 (10 people) plus materials fee.

The structure of Huck Lace provides a treasure trove of pattern for weavers. It is a shaftefficient weave structure where an 8-shaft loom produces 6-block patterns; and a 4-shaft loom produces sixteen different ways to combine textures of warp & weft floats with plain weave.

Weavers will learn how "blocks" or units of huck lace are threaded on four and eight shafts, and how they can be combined to expand design possibilities. Discussions will focus on converting a profile draft into a threading and treadling, and how literally thousands of designs are created with a single threading draft by changing the tie-up.

Participants will use printed Design Pages and Transparent Overlays from Neilson's book An Exaltation of Blocks to explore thousands of design possibilities for 6-block Huck Lace. A Transparent Overlay Template is used to determine the tie-up.

Patterns will be translated into woven towels. The Towel Project will consist of three  $4\frac{1}{2}$ " sections of Huck Lace, each a different color, separated by a one inch stripe of plain weave. The overall width of the project is  $16\frac{1}{4}$ " suitable for looms 18" wide or larger. For looms less than 18" wide, the stripes of plain weave are narrower, yielding an overall width of 15 1/3", suitable for looms 16" wide. For looms wider than 18", a fourth Huck Lace section with another 1" border can be added for a total width of 22". A six-yard warp yields five towels.

9 AM to 11 PM - PST - Morning Session PowerPoint Presentation - Introduction to Huck Lace on 4-shafts Introducing the sixteen 2-Block motifs ... the "building blocks" of 6-block patterns

Design Session: Developing 6-block symmetric patterns using 2-block motifs Participants need graph paper that is 4 squares to the inch (not 5 or 8) Pencils & eraser Ruler or straight edge

1 PM to 2 PM PST or so - Afternoon Session

Introduce participants to the Handout (sent via USPS mail in advance) How to use the Design Pages and Transparent Overlays for more 6-block designs GOALS for Day One Session:

PowerPoint Presentation: Understand structure of Huck Lace

Background is the default setting of Huck Lace created by Plain Weave or Tabby

Pattern is formed in two ways:

Adding a shaft to a tabby sequence creates a warp float

Subtracting a shaft from a tabby sequence creates a weft float

Design Session: Understand the difference between 2-part and 4-part symmetric motifs Develop five to ten 6-block designs before next meeting

Day Two

9 AM to 11 PM - PST - Morning Session Review the wide variety of 6-block patterns created on graph paper

PowerPoint Presentation: Introduction to Huck Lace on 8-shafts and how to use the Huck Lace Template to develop a treadling plan

Design Session: Turning 6-block graph paper patterns into treadling plans for Huck Lace Using the Huck Lace Template (a transparent overlay), learn when to add a shaft for a warp float and when to subtract a shaft for a weft float

1 PM to 2 PM PST or so - Afternoon Session

Continue translating Patterns into treadling plans

Discussion and tips on weaving Huck Lace Towels

Color possibilities

Strive for 16 picks per inch in weaving ... press (don't beat) with beater bar

In each 5-pick sequence, the most take-up occurs in picks 1, 3, 5.

The least amount of take-up occurs in picks 2 and 4.

If selvedges start to pull in, form a mountain of weft on picks 1, 3, or 5.

Close shed, and press back. Gradually increase size of mountain if need be.

GOALS for Day Two Session:

Firm understanding how to draft 75-pick sequence which makes each 6-block pattern Start weaving towel patterns (with confidence) after session is over

#### Day 3 - one week later

9 AM to 11 PM - PST - Morning Session

Design Session: How to convert 3-block motifs into 6 blocks of "pure" Huck Lace Adjacent blocks are warp-float and weft-float blocks

1 PM to 2 PM - Afternoon Session

Review weaving questions

A Forum will be established on Google for weavers to share their completed towels

Materials to be provided and fee for those materials.

Weavers will receive by mail a coil-bound with drafts and exercises, in addition to envelopes containing Design Pages, Transparent Overlays, and Huck Lace Template

Cost of Handout: \$25 plus first-class mail shipping - I can send all at the same time for central distribution (or if weavers live far away from pick up site, I can send directly to them.

Do you want the inside information on SHADOW WEAVE?

#### JANNIE TAYLOR ~ ROUND-ROBIN WEAVING WORKSHOP: EXPLORING SHADOW WEAVE (2 or 3 days)

My estimate for the cost of this class is approximately \$175, plus materials fee.

We are looking at sometime between November 11<sup>th</sup> and November 16<sup>th</sup> 2022

Students will gain an understanding of Shadow Weave by weaving samples of Shadow Weave designs on 4, 6, 8 and more shafts. Color drafting for Shadow Weave; influence of color, value and scale in Shadow Weave designs; and using Shadow Weave to create beautiful and unusual clothing, accessories and household textiles will all be covered. Students will each bring a loom, pre-threaded to a design provided by the instructor. Each workshop participant will leave the class with their own annotated Shadow Weave workbook and set of samples.

MAXIMUM NUMBER OF STUDENTS: 15 SKILL LEVEL: Beginner to advanced -- should be able to read a weaving draft and thread a loom

MATERIALS FEE: \$35.00 for a comprehensive full-color workbook OPTIONAL: \$15.00 fee for a digital collection of all workshop drafts + bonus drafts.

over 40 years. She teaches advanced weaving classes at the AVL Weaving School,

and has offered classes at every Convergence since 2008. An inspired teacher, she

enjoys sharing her knowledge and enthusiasm with other weavers in a relaxed,

collaborative environment. When she's not teaching, Jannie enjoys designing and

weaving one-of-a-kind silk garments and scarves that show her fascination with the

interplay of color, fiber, and structure within a woven work. Jannie has twice

earned the Handweavers Guild of America award for "Outstanding Creativity and

Craftsmanship in Weaving" and her work has appeared on the cover of Shuttle

Spindle & Dyepot, in Weaver's magazine, WeaveZine.com and Heddlecraft an online

weaving magazine. Long Threads Media recently released a video featuring Jannie
