September Report

Thanks to all who shared during the Cohort Report. There are so many resources to tap; it is great to know the positives and the negatives of each of these. Thanks to Kathleen for collating the information in one spot allowing members to make notes on resources. You now have experienced friends to approach if you have a question about one of these resources. You may also want to grab a friend, new or old, and form your own cohort. Explore!!

<u>In September</u>, the temperatures should be a bit lower than they have been. With the cooler mornings, we will throw caution to the wind and dye- <u>ice dye</u>- on September 9th. Do not forget to dress in older clothes. 

Workshops

Susan Van Winkle from the San Diego Creative Weaver's Guild contacted us about sharing the cost of some of their guild's workshops. Below, the workshops are detailed. Please read the descriptions. Figure the cost to be about \$200 (wild guestimate from Monica). The dates noted are for the SDCWG; out dates would fall before or after their workshop. If you are interested in these opportunities, please email Monica (rooksworld@sbcglobal.net) by September 4th. I will re-connect with Susan when I have a feel for the interest level. This is not a commitment, just an honest response.

Coming to San Diego the first weekend in May 2024 Natalie Drummond -Deflected
 <u>Doubleweave</u> (in person)

Participants have the opportunity to ice-dye their own pre-wound warps of tencel or cotton in a Zoom workshop a month before to work with color palettes of their own choosing or use one of my color palettes. Using ice-dyed warps in weaving with respect to a NEW Deflected Doubleweave draft

will be discussed by providing three different ways to use them in the draft according to color and value.

Coming to San Diego the First weekend in March 2024 - Joanne Hall - <u>Swedish Art</u>
 <u>Weaves Swedish Weaving</u>, <u>Swedish Art Weaves 2 - 5 days</u>

For most of her weaving years Joanne has been interested in Swedish weaving. Her interest comes from her Swedish heritage as well as a respect for the high quality of weaving in Sweden. A workshop from Hans Krondahl, a Swedish art professor who wove commission tapestries inspired her in the early

years. After eight trips to Sweden, attending four weaving conferences in Sweden, taking weaving and language classes, touring Swedish weaving factories and shops and meeting many Swedish weavers, Joanne enjoys teaching Swedish weaving techniques. This workshop is taught in one of two main categories of weaves: the Art Weaves: Bunden Rosengang (bound weave), Rolakan (tapestry),

Dukagang and Krabba (laid-in weaves) and Munkabalt (monk's belt). Materials and prewound warps can be sent in advance, approx, \$30-50 materials fee, depending on weaves chosen.

Coming to San Diego the first weekend in November 2024 Robyn Spady - <u>Cutting</u>
 Loose with Tied Weaves

Tied weaves are whole group of different ways to create patterned fabrics with floats of limited lengths. yes, one threading can provide a multitude of different treadling options - from singles and pairs to Dukagang and Taqueté. In this workshop, participants will learn the fundamentals of tied weaves and explore a wide variety of treadling techniques to create different results. For weavers interested in understanding terms like summer and winter, single two-tie, taqueté, samitum, and exploring Quigley or Bergman tied weaves, then this workshop is for them! Four- shaft loom minimum; eight shafts recommended. (Note: This is not a round-robin workshop.) Level: Adventure-seeking beginner through Advanced weaver.

Show and Sale



Important News from DeeDeeKing:

Ice Dyeing Fun

September's meeting will be a fun hands on day. We are going to do "Ice Dyeing", which is a perfect activity for a hot early fall day. You need to supply the item, or items to be dyed and some ice, a receptacle (think colander, or nursery flat tray that can drain), and the Guild will provide the rest. Ice dyeing is a very simple technique similar to "tie dye". It gives lovely, "watered look" results. We will be dyeing cellulose fibers, but I have adapted this technique to protein fibers as well.

- Bring your cotton, linen, rayon, tencel, bamboo, or hemp items to dye. You may dye yarn, t-shirts, scarves, and warps.
- Please clearly mark your items with permanent ink. You think you will recognize your item, but every year we do this, someone can't find their shirt.
- It is o.k. to over-dye a colored shirt. A couple of years ago, Silvia Leidig made some beautiful dyed shirts on pink and light blue shirts. Just remember to soak colored items separately from the white t-shirts, because the soda ash will cause the color to bleed out a little during the first soak.
- The guild will have plastic bags and paper towels, and gloves if you need them.

Ice dyeing is a simple process. You will soak your items in a solution of soda ash fixer and water, then, after squeezing out as much of the soda ash as you can, place your item in a container that can drain freely. We are going to be doing this on the lawn outside the

Memorial Building. Cover your item with a single layer of ice and then sprinkle a very small amount of dye powder over the ice. It doesn't take much. The ice will melt, carrying the dye through the fiber. As soon as the ice has melted and your item has drained a bit, you place it in a plastic bag overnight. Then rinse! rinse! rinse! in cold water. You can then machine wash and dry as usual, or let dry and use the unique yarn or warp you've created. Easy Peasey.



AND.....

This is a reminder of the 2023 challenge to the guild. I just wanted to get people thinking about November's meeting.

Dee Dee's 2023 Guild Challenge

I have too much yarn! When companies like Webs first got started, they would offer "odd lots" of yarns for bulk pricing. You didn't have much choice in color, but the price was fantastic. I used to buy a lot of yarn that way from different companies, so I have a very selfish challenge for the new year that is really suited for me. I know that not all of you have a stash of yarn that is great (as in large), but I think that everyone probably has a few bins of yarn that they don't quite know what to do with. You spinners are not exempt from having a stash of excess fiber to spin as well. So, with that in mind I propose that we go on a "yarn diet", or you spinners "add more fiber to your diet" in an effort to reduce our bulky stashes. Here are a few guidelines to help in your efforts to "lose weight" (yarn and fiber).

- Go on a yarn diet (weave until you can't anymore before buying anymore yarn)
- Spinners try to use up your stash fiber by spinning it up.
- Keep track of what you use up, so at the end of the year we can compare how well we "reduced".

• I say that yarn or fiber you need for a study group project would be exempt. Also, any custom orders that you need a special color for would be exempt as well.

This should be a fun challenge, and I have already started my "yarn diet". Challenge accepted. Thanks for the idea of a yarn diet from the Ravelry group, Warped Weavers.
