Here's an important news item to bring everyone up to speed:

Update on Slate of Officers for the 2024-2026 Term

In the discussion for the office of president for our guild, Lisa researched the laws regarding the California non-profits and Co-Presidents. She found that California non-profits (much like her home guild of Arizona) are not allowed to have Co-Presidents. A support role needs to be an appointed role as an Assistant to the President.

At the December meeting, there was a proposed change in bylaws. The guild members were offered additional wording, "until a replacement is found and elected." Hope moved and Cathy seconded. The membership approved this move. This is the current wording:

Article 5 Section 3 The term of office shall be for 2 years. No one may serve 2 consecutive terms as president unless the nominating committee is unable to fill the office, then the officer may continue serving in that position until a replacement is found and elected. (12/9/2023)

Because of this modification in the bylaws, voting was postponed until January. At the January meeting, Monica, the current Vice President, will open the meeting as there is no official President until the slate is approved. Julie will continue as President UNTIL a replacement is found and elected to that office.

From Kathleen Cone regarding Study Groups:

Our January meeting will be dedicated to forming study groups for the 2024 guild year. At this meeting we will all participate in picking the sections we want to consider for groups. Looking at the different spinning and dyeing groups it seems that maybe they could be combined into one spinning group and one dyeing group. If this is done, members could decide where to start and then work their way through the various subgroups.

Each group will decide among themselves how often and where they are going to meet. An idea might be to meet by zoom one month and then in person the next. Also, you might want to meet at various homes on a rotating basis. The plus of this is each person will have the luxury of not having to drive to a meeting at least once in the rotation.

So that we can have a productive meeting in January, I'm asking you to be thinking of various ways to set up a group and which group you might want to join since you can see who is interested in each group (this table was distributed by Kathleen earlier). I also suggest that you might want to reach out and contact different members to discuss what ideas they have.

EXTRA! EXTRA!

What is it all about?

This little adventure is in response to the many times people have expressed hesitation, confusion, and fear when it comes to weaving. The guild is here to help. It begins on January 13th (after the meeting - 1:30PM- you might want to bring an extra snack). Using a common project, and short lessons, we will guide you through each step of the weaving process. As you can see from the table below, the first

project is a scarf. Between January and February, you will decide on the specifics of your project and gather the materials. We will share warping board techniques in February; you will go home and use your warping board (dust it off first) and do the same with your materials. You will learn efficient ways to sley your reed and thread your loom. Weaving should be easy-peasy through April.

<u>From Jannie Taylor</u> One of Central Coast Weavers has the following for sale:

I have a WPA era counter balance, 4 shaft floor loom that I need to remove from my studio. There are two reeds and a continuous warp rack and about 250 spools of

cotton warp in neutral colors and a bench. It is currently set up in my studio in <u>Sanger, CA</u>. I purchased loom from Mennonite quilt store in Reedley many years ago and made the rack. Loom doesn't have a label but I'm fairly certain it's about 100yrs old. It is VERY sturdy. She has 36" weaving space, is 45" wide, is 41" long/deep. Spool rack is about 7' tall, 18" deep and about 6' wide. 2 newish 12 dent reeds (one attached to back to keep warp from tangling before it wraps around the drum. I think the wood is oak. Extremely sturdy and heavy. Perfect for rugs. Everything for weaving is included, asking \$500 for all. Transportation arrangements can be negotiated. Thank you,
