#1:

Would it be possible to rearrange the bits and pieces concept a bit, perhaps by having an area where individual guild members can sit and sell their one or two favorite items they have made? Have a place where they can visit with guests, talk about why they love fiber arts and actively provide advice and encouragement to wannabe fiber artists. #2:

Peggy's Tortellini Soup

6 Cloves of crushed garlic

3 tbsp butter

6 Cans of 13 oz chicken broth

3 8 oz packages of either frozen or dry cheese tortellini

2 10oz boxes of frozen spinach//add frozen

4 16oz cans of chopped tomatoes//un-drained OR 1 big can from Costco

1/2 tspn basil

1/2 tspn of Italian seasoning

Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese

Melt the butter, add garlic and all ingredients **except** the tortellini. You can add the rind of the Parmesan cheese in with this. Be sure to take out the rind before serving.

Cook for 1/2 hour or longer over medium heat then add the tortellini.

Serve warm with sprinkled Parmesan or Mozzarella Cheese

Serves @ 6 people.
